

## Guidelines

Galleries mentioned here are open to the public and offer free admission, unless otherwise noted. A number of them hold opening receptions in conjunction with the citywide First Thursday event, held on the first Thursday of each month, during which many galleries remain open later than usual; artists are often in attendance.

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Following the museum listings, art galleries are listed by neighborhood (SoMa refers to the South of Market district) in the following order:

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### ASIAN ART MUSEUM OF SAN FRANCISCO

**FRANCISCO**—Home to more than 14,000 art objects spanning 6,000 years of history and culture throughout Asia, the museum is one of the largest in the West devoted exclusively to Asian art. **Through Jul 16**, *The Three Gorges Project: Paintings by Liu Xiaodong* displays the artist's depiction of a changing landscape and country. **Through May 21**, *From the Fire: Contemporary Korean Ceramics* shows more than 90 works by 54 artists. \$10 (\$5 after 5 pm Th), \$7 seniors, \$6 students, ages 11 and under free; all free the first Tu of each month. **BAY AREA DISCOVERY MUSEUM**—Located in Marin County, this award-winning interactive learning center is designed for children up to age 10. **CARTOON ART MUSEUM**—Dedicated to the preservation, collection, study and exhibition of original cartoon art. 
**CHARLES SCHULZ MUSEUM**—This 27,000-square-foot museum is dedicated to preserving the art and legacy of the popular cartoon artist. More than 7,000 original comic strips are in the collection. ## Simplest art Color solo

There is inherent beauty in color, and Bay Area artist Keira Kotler's light jet prints mounted on aluminum put that beauty on display. Through July 7, Brian Gross Fine Art will present 13 of her works in *Luminas: Recent Photoworks*, shown in the lobby gallery at One Post St. (at the intersection with Market and Montgomery streets). Kotler has taken everyday objects and sights and used her technique to transform the imagery into vivid abstract color compositions. As with "Lumina Chartreuse," above, she named each piece after a color, keeping the focus on the simple emotions and sensory experiences evoked by the works.
